



Rod, Reel, Line And Leader Combo's

In most situations where mangrove jack are targeted the fishing is a "sudden death" affair. Super accurate casting puts the lure within inches of structure. Locked drags are used to wrestle the fish away from cover after an aggressive strike. Occasionally there are situations where fish are away from heavy structure and can be targeted with much lighter tackle, but for the most part jack fishing is a close-contact combat sport!

Baitcast Tackle

Baitcast tackle is popular with jack fishers because of its capability for delivering accurate casts, the powerful drag systems and the direct line of pull (ie it doesn't go around a bail arm, as a spin reel does). As I've already described, jack fishing tends to be a short-range tussle, so you won't need heaps of line and relatively small, low profile baitcast reels are perfect for the task.

Rods tend to be relatively short (6' to 6'6") to further improve casting accuracy and to facilitate casting in tight, overgrown mangrove creeks. A medium-fast or fast action rod helps with lure speed and accuracy and reduces the ability of the jacks to get back to cover. For many parts of Australia where a 50cm jack is a good fish a 3-5 kg line class rod is sufficient, but in SE Queensland where a 70cm monster is possible, or in super snaggy country, a 6-10kg rod may not be over the top.

Braided lines of 20-30lb and abrasion resistant leaders of 20-30lb are normal, although once again upping to 50lb braid and 50-60lb leader might be necessary on 60cm fish around bridge pylons and oysters.

Spin Tackle

Spin tackle is great for jack fishing too, if that's you're preference. In fact, in some circumstances it can be the better option. For example, there are times when casting unweighted or very lightly weighted soft plastics or small surface poppers can be very productive. Spin gear eats this style of fishing up, while it's a bit of a struggle on baitcast tackle.

A 3000 size spin reel is about right for most jack fishing and can be coupled with a 6'6" medium-fast to fast taper rod in the 3-6kg line class. 20-30lb braided mainline and a 20-40lb, abrasion resistant leader will suffice for most jack fishing. As with baitcast gear you may need to consider sizing up to a 6-10kg rod, 50lb braid and 50lb leader in extreme circumstances. The heavier gear is more tiring to use and restricts lure action, so the heavier gear isn't recommended unless there's no other option.

It doesn't hurt to have a lighter and longer rod of 7' and 2-3 kg or 2-4kg with a 3000 size reel 20lb braid and 20-30lb leader handy for those occasions when jacks are away from cover a little more and you want to cast small topwaters of unweighted plastics at them.

Lures

The following summarises information shared by ALF guests regarding their lure preferences for mangrove jack fishing. You'll get more detailed information on how to use these lures in specific locations and conditions.
